Provisions for the Journey

We've all just been handed something very special: a 'fresh brand new' New Year with which to do some very special things. OR not. It's really up to us.

As we prepare for the New Year, I'd like to offer a different focus for our New Year's enthusiasm. Let's focus on provisions for the journey through the year. Just as our ancestors had to stock up for their journeys westward, we need to be sure we have ample supplies.

Focusing on the year ahead, what are the most important "provisions" that you will need for the journey? When you think about the most challenging times in your life, what are the most important things that have tided you over? Personally, I can think of some prized things that have gotten me through. In Mark the disciples are told to take nothing for their journey except a staff; no bread, no bag, no money in their belts; just wear sandals and not to wear two tunics. Of the most precious things on my journey, I count the kind presence of friends and family in dark hours. I stockpile in my mind the sound of their voices. I also hoard in my heart those moments when I have been transported by beauty far beyond the ordinary. The ring of truth in scripture; wonder in the beauties of nature, or words of wisdom from a spiritual master. And those transcendent moments when I hear the voice of God through music or song.

These are my provisions for the times when the journey is challenging. So at the beginning of this new journey of 2018, as you prepare to venture forth in new experiences, I ask you to contemplate this: who and what are the real provisions of your life? Happy New Year!

With a new year often come New Year's resolutions. And if you're like me, those resolutions typically take the form of eating healthy, exercising more, being more generous...you know, the things I wanted to accomplish last year that I really didn't.

I'm not saying those resolutions are bad. Those three resolutions are on my list again this year. But one New Year's resolution I'm adding for this year is daily Bible reading. I've been amazed at my neglect of reading the Bible for spiritual growth. Too often I've studied the Bible only for my seminary classes in a rigid way. I've forgotten how the Bible can enrich my spiritual life. My goal for this upcoming year is to not see the Bible as a textbook but as a great way in which God speaks to me. I also hope you join me this year in delighting in reading Scripture and growing through the Word of God in our lives.
