### PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends in Christ,

At our last Council meeting, we agreed to participate in "Listening to the Spirit," a survey-and-plan offered by the Center for Parish Renewal. One of the Center's directors is Dale Ziemer, who resides in Palatine.

When I spoke with Dale about "Listening," I commented that I had told people at St. John that I did not have a "5-point plan" that would automatically reverse St. John's decline. I was thinking of actions that the congregation could take to increase attendance, giving etc.

After our conversation, it occurred to me that I DO have a "5-point" plan—a plan for individual spiritual renewal, which in turn will bring renewal to the congregation.


Point 1. Worship—every Sunday! 2. Pray—every day for spiritual growth for yourself and for St. John. 3. Read the Bible. Renewal in the church has always begun with the study of scripture. 4. Give and serve. Become a consistent "tither" (10% of your income to the Lord's work). 5. Invite. If a friend senses that you are enthused about your walk with Christ, he or she will be glad that you invited them to worship with you.

Good things are happening at St. John! But most important of all is spiritual renewal—and that begins with you and me following the "5-point plan"!

# Our Church Organ

St John is a congregational church. That means the congregation has a say in how we do things around here.

# This is what the congregation decided.

This 1885 organ treasure had some very worn out bellows that had been patched down thru the years. We received three quotes, all within the same repair cost. The council decided on a repairman that showed a love for the organ and a repair that honored its heritage and would last. Now there will be a breath of new life into it's old pipes with new bellows. The organ repair is estimated to cost approximately \$5,000.

### It was voted by the members of the congregation on Sunday, Sept. 24th to proceed with the repairs.

The vote was unanimous to make the needed repairs. It was announced to the congregation that there were benefactors who had stepped forward with generous donations to aid in the repairs. Thank you to all who have donated proactively to the organ repair fund. If you would like to add your donations to the cost of repairs, simply send a check with "organ fund" in the memo OR place it in the "my offering" envelope and mark the envelope "organ repair".

We look forward to hearing a "joyful noise" from our organ soon.

# **Water Test Results**

The council thought it prudent to test the well water since there were some water leakage issues. I am glad to report we passed with flying colors testing for bacteria, copper, iron, nitrate, lead, chlorine, pesticides. and ph/hardness. The ph/hardness was the only factor to show slightly higher levels, that is normal for well water.

**Speaking of the well...** There is an old water line that runs the church water from the well near the parsonage. A leak has developed by the church causing the water flowing into the basement.

It was voted unanimously by the members of the congregation on Sunday, Sept. 24th to run a new line rather than repair a very old line and risk future repairs for the remaining line. The new line is quoted at \$5,000.

# The Seminarian Says

October brings two images to my mind: harvesting and the Reformation. On farms around the Midwest, farmers will be starting up their tractors and combines and harvesting the crops they've been growing all summer. And in many parts of the world, Protestant Christians will be celebrating the 500th Anniversary of Martin Luther sending out his 95 Theses, which started the Protestant Reformation.

At the end of Matthew 9, Jesus sees the crowds that had gathered around him, and he had compassion on them for they were "harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd" (9:36). Jesus then turned to his disciples and said, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Therefore, ask the Lord of the harvest to send out workers into his harvest" (9:37-38). One of the main theological convictions that came out of the Protestant Reformation was the idea of the priesthood of all believers. We all have equal accessibility to God through Jesus Christ and we all are to act as ministers to one another. The United Church of Christ upholds this truth as well.

There are many people in the world that are looking for something more in their lives, something or someone that would guide them and help them. We know that someone is Jesus. And we are Jesus' disciples. In this harvest time, may it be our prayer here at St. John UCC to pray to the Lord to send us to someone, minister to them, and share the Good News that Martin Luther helped the church refocus upon. The harvest is plentiful. May we become the workers!
